Financial Summary (ministries report)

Donations to Shiloah Ministries Inc. were 19 % of 2016 donations (Sale proceeds excepted). SMI Expenses: 18% of 2016 operations. Operations bore the cost of one Uganda contract employee and school fees and supplies for the 40 students that we support from KG through High School.

Bank Balance was slightly lower due to the loss incurred by the reduction of donor income. The balance has been placed in short term 1.35% short term certificates and cash balance in a operations checking account. Factors affecting future operations will be the increase of school fees and operations expenses, helping other charities in Africa and expenses for projects such as the well and water tower, bathrooms, kitchen and other request where we are able to help.

Operations

January -We started with 24 of which are at Morning Star

February, we continued work on getting government approval to drill a well and complete the water tower.



Also 3 students started



at Ebenezer Secondary and 7 at Zana Presbyterian Secondary for studies. The Van was repaired for Morning Star transport but during the year failed again and





motorcycle transport was arranged for as requested by parents. March – I informed donors of "progress" with this quote, "We have the go to the bank to pay the 450,000Ugx (\$150 – in process) and then [pay] the drilling company 60 % of the fee (\$12,000) next week, after we complete the form". Well that was accomplished, but it was not to be until December of 2017



that the drilling took place. *Adeline* made academic news in that she was number one in the class with a perfect report (100 percent for each subject), and it was an indication of things to come (got a new orange T-shirt). **April** – All three schools reported the closing of the term with completion of the curriculum. **BUT**, during a spring storm the as yet empty tank was blown off of the tower. It would be put back during December's work on the well drilling and installation (new kitchen in the back ground (SMI's 2016 project build with the



bathrooms). May – We added to the student sponsorships with the 2 boys from the Nasubuga mom whose husband abandoned the family three years ago. Morning Star asked for a printer (which we funded / purchased), and Ebenezer Secondary sent us a photo of their facility (left). The



old car is used for "trade school" classes in Auto Mechanics. Now

Morning Star has the new kitchen in full use with the start of the Second Term of 2017. **June –** The students use the playing fields for exercises (lower right).

JULY – A new family request for help. Mr. Alex (our contract

construction manager requests SMI to aid a family with medical

funding of Mr Sentamu's need for a prosthetic limb and help with his five children in school. His leg was amputated due to a hit and run car causing massive medical bills and loss of ability to work (carpentry) as well as support the family (wife and 5 children). SMI decided to support the family









with the proviso that all the children would attend Zana
Presbyterian Primary and Secondary School in 2018. They will
take transport in a public Van and all five will be in the same
school. Mr. Sentamu has returned to work and can now begin to
restore the support of his family from his devastating injury.

August – time for new shoes as ROSE Nanteza (Country
Manager) inspects the children for us to assess their needs
(uniforms) before the final Term of 2017. The results continue to

















be very good and Adeline maintains a perfect record and 100% in all subjects, and number 1 of the sponsored kids and her class at Morning Star Primary Christian School.

September – Yes soon they along with Zana kids and Ebenezer students will be finished as they will all wave good bye for the year and hopefully the now (40) sponsorship children will vacation until late



January 2018. Richard Mwebe made contact now 23 years old, to reactivate his sponsorship leading to graduation (accepted at Ebenezer) from S6 and then to study to become a minister. He, a graduate from S4 at Day Spring Christian Academy, needs to complete S5 & 6 before entering college and then seminary. He was working in a Church in Nateete, Uganda.

By now the Morning Star Van has ceased its operating ability and funds are not available to buy new transport so requesting kids ride a motor bike for about \$0.50 per trip.

October – The final Term for the year and **November -** PLE for the P7 kids, the national Primary leaving exam. We hope the best for Daniel

Mutumba (Yes he did become a Div I graduate – Congratulations and will attend Zana Presbyterian Secondary - S1). Daniel's sister Irene, No. 1 in her class as well, has a special story. She came to Day Spring early on as a sponsored student. Irene had received a polio shot in her hip (badly administered) and had a disability in her walking. We assigned one of Day Spring's staff to take daily exercise with her walking up and down steps daily, 50 + steps, and she is now healed. **Praise God**. And we hope the best as Adeline now has two terms with a perfect score and is still number 1 in her class. **December –** We finally have maneuvered through the government and now have approval to drill a well. Mr. Alex reported that we saw pure clean drinking water flow into the tank. In support of Operation Smile (see




